Mennonite Coalition for Refugee Support - "He was like an angel to me..."

The refugee crisis in the Mediterranean and Europe and the desperation of so many seeking safety is compelling and horrifying. Refugees take a dangerous road to find safety, hoping to build a new life asking only for a safe haven. The thanksgiving offered for the simplest of supports MCRS offers them, is truly humbling.

MCRS assists refugee claimants through their legal claim and settlement process. Right now we are responding to the current Syrian refugee crisis. In the past Canada's response to tragedy has been swift and generous. We welcomed 60,000 people from southeast Asia in 1979-80 and airlifted 5,000 people from Kosovo in the late 1990s. Canada has accepted only 2,374 refugees from Syria during the current crisis. The desperate stories of Syrian refugee claimants coming through MCRS offices right now are heart wrenching; it is so difficult for them to escape Syria, leaving everything to travel here. In fact, even when they arrive, the reality is that fewer refugees are being allowed into Canada at all. It has become harder to get here, harder to get in and much, much harder to stay.

This makes *Halil's story even more extraordinary. Halil is 16 years old, a young man from Syria. His town was overrun by ISIS and they threatened him with death unless he joined them. His family, desperate to keep their son safe, used all their money and bought him a ticket to Turkey to stay with relatives there, already refugees. Halil, now safe, was still desperately worried about his family left behind. Daily, he would go to a local park to be alone. One day, as he wept, overcome with frustration, an elderly man approached him in friendship and he shared his story.

One day the man said, 'I want to help you. Give me your Syrian Passport.' Hesitant, Halil spoke to his parents. They were extremely worried, but said, 'Son, go ahead, maybe he can help you, but please, be careful!' Halil trusted the stranger, and a few days later the man gave him his Syrian passport, a Swedish passport, and two plane tickets; one to Canada and one to Jordan. He took Halil to the airport and said, 'Check in for the flight to Jordan using your Syrian passport, but do not get on the plane! Come back and re-enter Turkey pretending to be a Swedish tourist on your new passport. Then use the Swedish passport to leave Turkey again and get on the flight to Canada.'

Amazingly, this worked. Halil arrived in Canada, and was able to claim refugee status. Halil says in wonder, 'This man, he is like an angel to me.' Halil was lucky to receive such kindness. But how many other youth are taken advantage of, smuggled, or worse as they try to escape from war and danger?

When he calls his mother he hears the sound of bombs falling in the background, and his little sister, crying. His father has disappeared and the family doesn't know where he is. He is frantic to bring his family to safety in Canada, but it can take more than 2 years to bring family members here through Canada's slow family re-unification process.

Every year around Thanksgiving we consider how grateful we are for our loved ones, and the safety and stability that we enjoy here in Canada. Every year around Thanksgiving, we also meet people who walk through our doors with stories of great injustice, and often great bravery and strength. Our work at MCRS ensures that refugee claimants arriving in Waterloo Region experience welcome, compassion, inclusion, and justice. And refugee claimants need your help.
